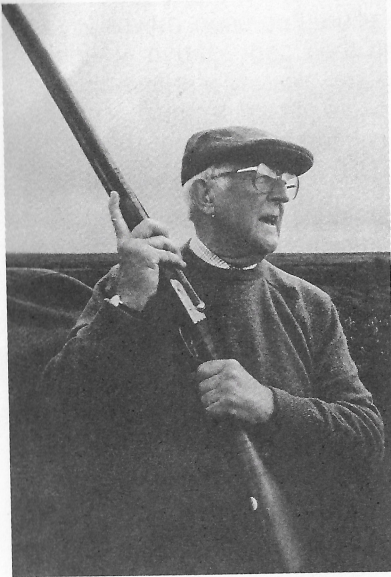

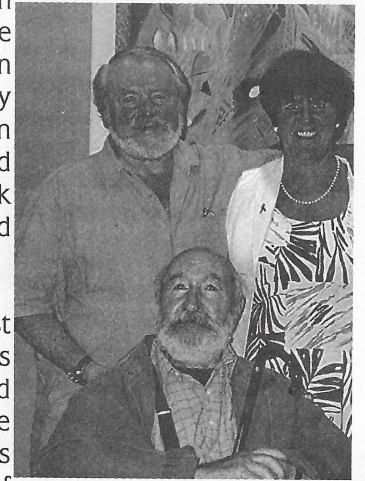

The Granuaile Trust of the O'Malley Clan



Paintings St Brigid's Abbey, Clare Island

The Trust has been quietly working away over the past two years. The cell of the Cistercian Abbey on Clare Island (which was one of the main reasons for the setting up of the Trust, inspired by the late Grace O'Malley Purcell) has been the main recipient of the Trust funds. The Abbey is said to date from the mid 13th-century though it was rebuilt around 1460. It houses the O'Malley crest and a canopied tomb which is reputed to be the burial site of Granuaile. On the ceiling and walls are the remains of paintings of animals, dragons, cattleherders, warriors which are among the finest examples of medieval wallpaintings extant in

Ireland. During the past year a symposium was held on Clare Island on the work done to date on the preservation of the Abbey and its wallpaintings. The conservator, Christoph Oldenbourg, was delighted with the Trust's financial injection which enabled him to avail of new laser treatment for the paintings. It would be very worthwhile to take a trip to Clare Island to see the transformation which is the result of the dedication of all those involved in the preservation of a gem of our heritage.

Donie

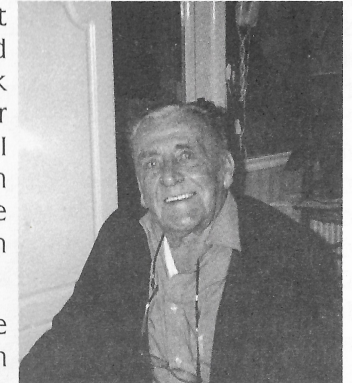
An Appreciation by Rosaleen Kavanagh Norton

I can't consciously remember first meeting Donie, but somehow he was always there, like Mammy and Daddy, he was always in my life. I'd say if we could ask the man when he first met me, without trying to flatter myself, Donie no doubt would remember meeting me. I bet he would tell us that he met his "Dark Rosaleen" on a wet Wednesday in November 1956, not least for the fact that not a lot happens on a wet Wednesday in Rathdowney.

Donie & Grace were my first visitors on the day I made my grand entrance into this world and the photograph that was taken that day depicted a young and dapper Donie and a mighty handsome Grace. Funny, although this photo is black and white I always imagined that the crombie coat Donie was wearing was navy, and that the scarf which hung casually 'round his neck was wine silk with a tiny little navy spot, one of the finest Williams Men's Outfitters would have stocked for the more discerning gentlemen of the community.

I have a load of memories of Donie. These come to mind in no particular order or indeed any order of importance. One thing that Donie said to me years ago when I was working for him in the Corner House, collecting glasses, stands out: "Bubbles (his pet name for me) when you're in the pub business you listen to what people say. You say yes or no. You do not agree or disagree nor offer an opinion, and never, ever repeat what you've heard". Now this was brilliant advice no matter what line of work you were in and if I had to heed even half of that advice I would have avoided a lot of confrontations over the years. I was only young at the time, and didn't care to even understand it or possibly was not able to, but it stays with me still. Now I think, what a wise old pusher Donie was, and if he had written down all the things he heard, all the situations he observed, wouldn't we have some brilliant works to read? I have no doubt that Donie would have been able to portray these stories as well, if not better than that famous author/publican, John B. Keane. Alas, that's not to be, so we may pin our hopes on John for that publication!

How Donie got his name: I can remember we were in the Golf with Donie. I can picture that day in my mind as if it only happened yesterday. It was the old Club House, wooden and painted pale blue. John Paul and I were with Donie at the main door, beside the bar area where the locker room was situated. He was changing his golf shoes and socks, when he showed us his webbed toes and told us he was called Donie after Donald Duck and because he had been blessed with webbed toes, he could swim before he could walk.

Not your ordinary weather vein: As we all know the Met office is not that reliable with its forecasts. It is often cursed in and out of the ground by a multitude of irate farmers who had their hay flattened into the ground because the Met gave non stop sunshine for a week but no sun appeared only the dreaded rain. And yes it was sunny in Greece (no doubt a slip of the chart) but it rained cats and dogs in Ireland and not a bale was saved. But as in all walks of life you have the 'cute hores' who never lost a bale and always seemed to pick the right week to cut the hay. Well it took us awhile to figure this out. And then like a crack of lightening out off a clear blue sky, it clicked; these 'cute hores' knew it wasn't going to rain because Donie O'Malley had the caravan out. It was said that if Donie decided to bring the "cream mystery machine" with its orange upholstery and curtains, out of the back garage on the bleakest and grayest December day, low and get hold we would have an unseasonable heat wave —and funnily enough also around the time the caravan came out, Ellen got painting and many a disaster followed, but alas that's a story best saved for another day.

I remember one such time the caravan was out and Kinvara braced itself for the arrival of "The O'Malleys" who were known in Kinvara as one of their own. Ellen decided that we would all hit Kinvara and surprise the holiday makers. Off we set in the green Citroen Amie. If cars could talk!! Arrived in Kinvara a couple of hours later although that journey seemed like six and a half weeks to me as I wasn't the best traveller and from Roscrea to Kinvara there were many stops for air!!! Anyway, when we got to the "cream mystery machine" no Donie nor Grace. I don't know what made us think that they were going to sit there and wait in case Ellen and a clatter of kids might drive half a day to visit them. We were so dispirited that we weren't going to be entertained in the Caravan. Unperturbed Ellen decided to go around the town and see did anyone know of them or their whereabouts. Well everyone from the craft shop to the pub knew the couple from Rathdowney and they also knew that they were gone for a drive. After about two hours we were all getting pissed off and being the year that Ellen had spent sometime in Finthorn in Scotland, she told us to concentrate and picture the car coming back. Well I'll be damned if the metallic green Datsun didn't come round the corner. Grace got the surprise of her life. Donie had a feeling and had come back earlier than planned.

From a child's perspective it felt like real magic when we went in with Grace and Donie, just to have a look. The wonder, the questions!. Where did they perform the delicate matters like toilet and wonder in amazement at the portable T.V. that Donie ran on batteries number AA size. (I later learned he used the car battery.)

You know that caravan was like Wanderly Wagon. No one else in the town owned a dream machine like that. The nearest anyone else got was a wet week in Tramore with seven children and morning sickness.

When I started to write I never thought I had so many memories of Donie O'Malley my Godfather. If I was to document them all I could have a book. For now I will have to close and leave you and me to ponder Donie O'Malley —a man or an institution?
